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## Executive Summary

The **Chicago Peace Fellows** is a unique leadership development program created by the **Goldin Institute** for grassroots leaders on the front lines of building safer and more peaceful communities across the city in partnership with the Chicago Fund for Safe and Peaceful Communities.

The Chicago Fund is a strategy of the **Partnership for Safe** and Peaceful Communities, a coalition of 50 foundations that are aligning their investments to support proven and promising approaches to reducing gun violence.

Designed in collaboration with past grantees of the Chicago Fund and with input from a wide range of civic leaders, this GATHER course provides a series of core social change concepts and tools for authentic community **engagement**. The curriculum encourages learning, practice and reflection, augmented through workshops led by partner organizations heading violence prevention work throughout the city.

The Chicago Peace Fellows program connects and equips a select group of past grantees of the Chicago Fund for Safe and Peaceful Communities representing neighborhoods across the West and South sides. The Peace Fellows come together as a community of practice, learning and working together to promote peace at a grassroots level.

Chicago Peace Fellows utilize the technology of the **GATHER** platform, an online learning hub built by the **Goldin Institute** to empower grassroots leaders. Each Fellow received a **stipend** and access to the GATHER platform for shared learning and real-time collaboration. By connecting Chicago leaders through GATHER, their work is more effective, interconnected and sustainable.

Chicago Peace Fellows learn from one another, their local communities. and the Global Alumni Network. Upon Graduation, Peace Fellows join the Global Alumni Network for ongoing training, monthly workshops and facilitative support. Through this global community, the Chicago Peace Fellows share their wisdom around violence prevention with civic leaders in Chicago and beyond.

## The Goldin Institute



Since 2002, the Chicago-based Goldin Institute has inspired, equipped and connected grassroots leaders in over 50 countries to lead community-driven social change. 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## **GATHER**

GATHER is an **online learning platform** designed to support shared learning and collaboration between a community of practice. The suite of tools on the GATHER platform enables Fellows to learn, work and reflect together on real issues facing their communities.



**Discussion Boards:** A chance for the group to share reflections with each other about topics and practices.

**Peer-to-Peer Chat:** We invite Fellows to communicate with each other informally as well as through required interactive assignments with peers.

**Resource Library:** Fellows can dive deeper on key topics with curated resources and add their own knowledge and materials to the growing shared library.

**Field Guides:** Fellows have access to "just in time" summaries of key ideas and new skills that are easily accessible for use in the community.

**Contacts:** As Fellows meet new people through practical assignments, they capture contact information to grow their network and expand local partnerships.

**Budget Tracker:** Fellows can keep track of their expenses using the budget tracker app to help them build a track record of fiscal management.

Weekly Roundtables: Through periodic workshops, key ideas and skills covered in the curriculum are presented and discussed with leading experts on the theme.

**Digestible**: Interactive content is designed to be mobile friendly so that Fellows can complete the curriculum and related activities in 2 - 4 hours per week.


**Interactive:** Private journaling, discussion boards and practical assignments help Fellows learn, practice and reflect together.

**Audio-Visual:** Each chapter includes a mix of writings, videos, illustrations, photos and other forms of content to reach a wide variety of learning styles.



## **Learning Together**

The **GATHER** curriculum is not a traditional teacher-to-student course, but rather an opportunity for a community of practice to learn and work together. Interactive chapters guide Fellows through key concepts and provide them space for shared reflection after they put those methods into practice. In addition to this online resource, Fellows participated in workshops with organizations doing violence prevention work throughout the city of Chicago.


The GATHER curriculum was developed collaboratively through a series of interviews and focus groups with over 50 past grantees of the Chicago Fund for Safe and Peaceful Communities, dozens of civic partners engaged in violence prevention, and with feedback from the network of alumni of the Chicago Peace Fellows program. The 2024 GATHER curriculum unfolds over nine chapters, each organized around a key question or theme critical to peace building in Chicago.

Through the online GATHER platform, the Fellows explored themes like Asset Based Community Development, intersectionality, the nature of community leadership, and approaches to creating shared visions for the future with neighbors. Curriculum like readings and videos were complemented by the practical application of these concepts in the real world. Fellows met weekly to reflect on these concepts and to share their experiences putting these ideas into practice in their work and lives.

Complementing the content on the GATHER platform, the Peace Fellows also participated in 22 workshops, events and roundtable discussions over the course of the six month fellowship.

These workshops and roundtables were designed to deepen understanding of the core themes of the course, to build community and collaboration between the Fellows, and to create connections with key leaders in Chicago's violence prevention and peacebuilding communities.

## **LEARNING APPROACH**



### KEY WORKSHOPS

In addition to the content explored on the GATHER Platform, the Chicago Peace Fellows experience offers the opportunity to meet leaders of institutions and initiatives supporting a more peaceful and safe Chicago. In 2024, the Fellows met with a wide range of organizations including government agencies, universities, non-profits, and more.

Through interactive workshops with leading organizations, the Chicago Peace Fellows engage in the broader conversation around violence in the city and highlights the unique roles of grassroots community leaders in prevention and healing. Great care is taken to ensure that these are level conversations where the Fellows have an equal and respected voice at the table.

## Chicago Peace Fellow Welcome Event

On March 14th, the Chicago Peace Fellows class of 2024 convened at the Chicago Cultural Center to meet one another and learn about the program. At this event, Fellows were welcomed by the Goldin Institute team and philanthropic leaders and shared insights about how best to support one another throughout the journey ahead.



## Actively Remove Barriers

On March 28th, the Chicago Peace Fellows visited Bethel New Life. Advocate Health presented their work in helping gunshot victims by providing holistic services such as housing, food, employment, counseling and family support with the hope that they can interrupt the cycle of violence and retaliation. Bethel gave an overview

of their community initiatives and laid out opportunities to join in their work. The Fellows were able to learn about the public health model of violence reduction and explored how they can support ongoing efforts.



# **Asset Based Community**

On April 11th, Chicago Peace Fellows participated in a virtual workshop with program director Burrell Poe to explore their talents and strengths. In this workshop, Fellows shared the results of the Gallup Strengths Finder program with one another with an emphasis on how they can impact grassroots leadership. Fellows had an opportunity for self-reflection and develop an appreciation for the gifts of

others as an important part of the Fellows process.



# Asset Based Community

On April 25th, Chicago Peace Fellows met at the Logan Square Library to learn about asset mapping. Goldin Institute's Senior Director of Programs John Ziegler presented on ABCD - Asset Based Community Development - and his experiences using it in his work. Fellows shared insights about their neighborhoods as

they identified hidden assets where they lived and worked. Fellows mapped their locations on a large Chicago map, finding relationships, and identifying ways to collaborate across the city.



# Peace Building in Garfield Park

### **Breakthrough Ministries**

On May 16th, Chicago Peace Fellows took a tour with 2020 Alumni Damen Morris, Senior Director for Violence Prevention at Breakthrough Urban Ministries in Garfield Park. Fellows had an opportunity to see the variety of services provided by Breakthrough and learn about street outreach

# Role of Design in Peacebuilding

On May 30th, Chicago Peace Fellows met at the Black Star Project with Gloria Smith, Chicago Peace Fellow 2019, who shared about the impactful work the organization has accomplished for decades. Led by CPF Director Michael Hendersen and Senior Director of Programs John Ziegler, the Fellow learned of ways

to differentiate between leadership and authority, ways to remove barriers for participation in neighborhoods, and strategies for convening the right people to add to your team.



## **Power of Storytelling**

On September 19th, Chicago Peace Fellows attended a storytelling workshop at Free Street Theater. In this workshop, Fellows learned about the different elements of effective storytelling and the power of crafting compelling narratives. Fellows also had a chance to practice sharing their stories and receiving feedback, which helped Fellows reflect on the message they want to share at their graduation.

# Building on Assets


A core skill of the Asset Based Community
Development (ABCD) approach is the creation of an **Asset Map**. This process does not ignore challenges
or structural inequalities, but seeks to complement
the analysis of what needs to be fixed with a
robust exploration of "what's working" and what
we can build on in our communities. Each Fellow
was invited to create a map or inventory of those
places, groups, organizations, tools, knowledge, and
experiences that already exist in their community in
collaboration with their neighbors.

Asset mapping is an **ongoing, collaborative process** that relies on building trust and engaging neighbors as we expand our networks to improve our communities.


There's no right way to make an asset map!

As part of the GATHER curriculum, Fellows were asked to make their own personal map as a starting place for a conversation with community members. Each Fellow shared their own inventory of favorite places and community assets during a "community walk" with neighbors where everyone was invited to add associations and institutions that they know of to the map and collectively expand the list of people and places that could be invited to help make progress and get involved.

The Community Asset Map required each Fellow to convene a team of friends, neighbors and Learning Partners to collectively produce an asset map that would help make connections between the people and institutions that can help make change in their communities. The **process of making an Asset Map can be just as important as the map itself**, with participants thinking together about what strengths and unique identities fortify their neighborhoods.



Using a pool of \$21,375 donated by philanthropic leaders in Chicago, the Chicago Peace Fellows co-designed 7 collaborative peacebuilding projects informed by the principles and practices explored in the curriculum to reduce violence and build peace across the city.

### PLANNING WORKSHOPS



Initial project ideas suggested by Fellows.

After four months of intensive learning and trust building as a community of practice, the 2024 Chicago Peace Fellows put the **principles of community driven social change into practice** by co-designing six peacebuilding projects in Chicago. These projects were designed by the Peace Fellows to model the structural changes they seek: collectively they are 19 grassroots leaders who live and work in the communities they serve on the West and South sides, and they practice a liberatory model of shared leadership, collaborative decision-making and collective action.

As grassroots leaders, Peace Fellows are on the front lines of responding to the challenges of violence that impact their communities on the West and South sides. The spirit of collaboration and the commitment to equity and justice

runs deep amongst the Chicago Peace Fellows, and these co-designed projects collectively help get to the root issues driving violence.

These projects were designed in a highly collaborative series of **three workshops** with a foundation of trust built on months spent **learning and working together** through the GATHER Platform, where Fellows explored the principles of community-driven social change — like asset mapping, community engagement, framing issues, intersectionality, appreciative inquiry and frameworks for community leadership.



### TRADEOFFS



Fellows weighed trade-offs to help clarify their priorities.

**Determining Our Shared Values and the Decision-Making Process:** In this session, the Fellows came up with a list of principles and shared values to guide the work ahead and affirmed the parameters for the decision making process.

**Sharing Our Current Projects:** In this session, Fellows completed project idea cards that document the work they are currently doing that they think could benefit from collaboration with others Fellows. This allows people to make their current work visible so they can create mental space for creative ideas in the future.

**Envisioning New Projects:** In this session, Fellows create new project idea cards documenting ideas they would like to pursue if they had the support they needed.



Big Ideas that were related were combined into project proposals.

**Shared Aspirations:** In these sessions, Fellows reviewed all of the "existing" and "new project" cards and grouped them under common themes they uncovered between the projects. Through this process of moving and sorting cards, they identified thematic areas of shared aspirations.

**Setting our Priorities:** In this session, Fellows were guided through a process of naming and negotiating the trade-offs inherent in program design. For example, deep vs wide: do we want to do as many projects possible or go invest in a smaller number of more urgent priorities? This session ended with a clarification of our key priorities for making project decisions.




Fellows "voted with their dollars" to make funding decisions based on shared values.

**Refining Our Ideas:** In these sessions, we returned to the collection of project idea cards and teams self-selected to take clusters of related projects and combine them as appropriate into discrete project proposal cards with timelines and budgets. Teams sought to get feedback from neighborhood leaders as part of the design and prioritization process.

**Collaborative Funding:** The group refined these project proposals and selected final projects for consideration by the collective. All Fellows were then given equal portions of the available funding to put towards the projects of their choosing. If some projects received more than they needed, they expanded their project or shared their excess with other projects at the discretion of the team. In most cases, they chose to share their funding with other groups because they all had a stake in the work of the collective.

#### SUMMER PROJECTS

Over the course of six planning workshops, the Peace Fellows collaboratively designed six initiatives that put the principles of the GATHER curriculum into practice on the West and South sides of the city.

The process was open and democratic and offers a vision and model for truly participatory grant-making, where the goals, evaluation and funding decisions are all made by those grassroots leaders closest to the issues.

The only guidelines for the group were that projects had to be collaborative, with more than two Fellows working together, and designed to have an impact or meet a significant milestone this summer. Several of the projects will continue long after graduation, a testament to the ongoing commitment of the Peace Fellows.

### BLOCK CLUB DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP

Our vision is to see neighborhoods transformed into thriving, unified communities where every individual is actively engaged, supported, and empowered to contribute to collective wellbeing. We envision block clubs as the foundation for fostering lasting relationships, safety, and a deep sense of belonging in every community.










# Chicago Peace Fellows Event Timeline







Anthony Jones is the Project
Manager for the You Matter program
at the Darren Easterling Center. An
educator, criminal justice reform
advocate, and paralegal today,
Jones was sentenced to life without
parole at 20. He transformed
his life in prison, pursuing higher
education and spiritual resurrection,
embraced a new name, Anaviel
Ben Rakemeyahu, and became a
respected leader.

He earned a paralegal certification, two college degrees, and a state certificate as a peer health educator and mentor. Jones helped many incarcerated citizens file successful petitions, including his own, and was released July 28, 2021 after almost 30 years incarcerated.
